Maple syrup dominates the menu, of course, but it's the views overlooking the marina, the St. Lawrence and downtown that make this sugar shack truly unique. Weekends only.



## LET'S GO "GLAMPING"

These days, camping is a lot more than just pitching a tent in the middle of the forest. Creature comforts have become so important that they've spawned a whole new, ready-to-camp concept dubbed "glamping" (glamour + camping). All that would-be "glampers" need to bring are their personal items – clothes, sleeping bags, food – to the site where, as the case may be, their tent, yurt, caravan or cabin, is ready and waiting.

Located in the Parc Éco des
Laurentides, Les Refuges
Perchés Mont-Tremblant (Mont
Tremblant Treehouses) have
managed to literally raise the
bar: As their name suggests,
accommodations are set up in
the trees. Each wood-heated unit
is equipped for cooking and is
accessible by hiking trail (10 to
20 minutes' walk from the reception
area) or canoe (luggage carts and

canoe provided). There's no running water, but all units boast sunny terraces with terrific views of the natural surroundings. Open year-round, the facility offers seasonal activities like snowshoeing in winter and, in warmer weather, swimming and fishing.

The mountain station Au Diable Vert in Sutton in the Eastern Townships also offers lodging in the trees. Here, the view over Mount Sutton and the lush valley below is breathtaking at any time of year. Hiking trails, wide and easy to negotiate on relatively flat terrain, become more sinuous and strenuous as you trudge through the woods, up hillsides, across streams and rivers and along gentle cliffs. Feeling more adventurous? You can also kayak on the nearby Missisquoi River.
